This exciting transformation has recently been supported by \$4.75 million in funding support from the Australian Government through its Thriving Suburbs Program.

The funding covers roughly half the estimated project cost and will go towards the design and function of Belvidere Street, including alfresco dining areas, green spaces, enhanced lighting and improved amenity.

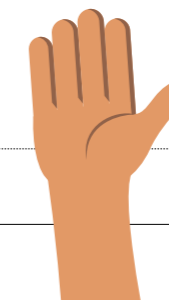
The Australian Government funding represents an investment in our local community with a focus on providing community spaces and opportunities for community connection, as well as enhanced liveability for current and future residents.

We have renewed our sister city agreement with Adachi-Ku, Japan, marking 40 years of international friendship.

Our partnership began in 1984 and has helped bring our two communities closer together through learning and cultural exchanges.

One of the highlights is the annual student exchange, which gives young people a chance to experience life in another country, explore new cultures, and form lifelong friendships. Every five years, a citizen delegation takes place to reaffirm the agreement and strengthen the bond between our two cities.

The renewed agreement ensures these exchanges will continue for future generations, creating opportunities to learn, grow, and connect across cultures.

Caring for our environment

Trees

Trees bring life to our City, beautifying streets, providing shade, and supporting wildlife.

We carefully manage, plant and care for the trees that line our streets, verges and local parks.

Each year between January and May we complete our powerline pruning program guided by Western Power.

Pruning can be a risky business for a tree – so we have an expert team to trim them in line with arboricultural standards.

This protects our trees, while making sure they're clear of footpaths, roads and powerlines.

Incorrect or excessive pruning increases the risk of disease and decay, and can make tree branches less stable. We carefully assess each location and only remove or prune trees when needed.

Lakes and waterways

With the warmer weather you may notice changes to our lakes and wetlands.

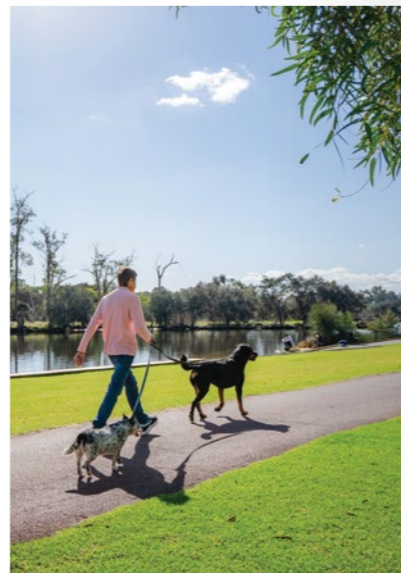
Increased nutrients in the water can lead aquatic plants and algae to quickly spread across the surface, creating a temporary 'bloom'. This includes common native plants that provide shelter and food for local wildlife.

The colour of the water may change from the growing algae, but fear not! It's a naturally occurring process that settles over time and isn't a health risk.

We monitor each of our waterways for any algae or toxins that may be harmful to our community or environment.

The changing waterways can also impact our local wildlife. Birds are more likely to ingest the toxin causing Avian (bird) botulism. It is more common in waterbirds, so make sure to report any wildlife concerns.

School parking

School is back and so is the school run. Follow these simple tips to help make the school run stress free and safe:

- Follow speed and parking signs.
- Don't park across footpaths, driveways or median strips.
- Use kiss and drive spots if you're not planning on leaving your car.
- Park your car away from the busiest areas and walk.
- Be mindful of your surroundings, especially while reversing your car.

Be a good sort

With our three bin FOGO system, you can help reduce waste going to landfill, and create a cleaner, greener community.

Together, small changes can make a big difference.



Tips for sorting waste correctly

- FOGO (lime-green lid): For food scraps, garden clippings, and organic waste. Remember, if it lives or grows, it's FOGO!
- Recycling (yellow lid): Clean paper, cardboard, plastics, glass bottles, and cans go here. Make sure they're free from food scraps.
- General waste (red lid): For things that can't be composted or recycled, like soft plastics, nappies, and broken ceramics.

Recycling bin upgrades

Property owners can upgrade their yellow 240L recycling bin to a larger 360L bin at no extra cost. Ready to make the switch? Book your upgrade today.

General waste bin upgrades

If you're having trouble managing your general waste, we also offer an upgrade for red general waste bins.

Property owners or managing agents can increase the bin size from 140L to 240L for an annual fee of \$74.50.

This fee covers the cost of collecting and processing the extra waste and is added to the property's rates notice.

Some households may qualify for a fee waiver on medical or compassionate grounds.

CountUSin is a 10 week wellness program for City of Belmont residents aged 18+ years who are not working full time.
